Settled by the Salado from A.D. 1225-1400, this pueblo is thought to have been a trade center in ancient times. The pueblo is constructed of large river boulders, contains three central plazas and 300 rooms. Pinal Creek was used to irrigate fields of corn, beans, cotton and squash. When it was abandoned, artifacts including ceramics, shell jewelry, mats and baskets were left behind.

The Great House is thought to have been used for ceremonial and astronomical observation.

The visitor's center and free museum complex are associated with Casa Malpais, a designated National Historic Landmark site that is dated between 1240 – 1400 A.D. Displays include prehistoric artifacts recovered during excavations at the pueblo. This Mogollon pueblo is thought to be one of the most important trade and ceremonial centers in the Southwest. Occupied in the 13th and 14th centuries, it was abandoned by 1400. The pueblo contains over 120 rooms built on a series of terraces. It contains one of the largest square kivas found in the U.S. Only recently opened to the public, there are guided tours leading to the top of the mesa and past petroglyph sites to the Grand Kiva. In the summer, Hopi and Zuni storytellers offer programs. Both Tribes claim an ancestral connection to the site and are part of the site research teams.

The site is an interesting intersection of Native American, Spanish, Mexican and Euro-American cultures.

A visitor center, artifacts, exhibits from the 12th and 13th centuries, demonstrations, hiking trails, ranger-led tours and programs are offered. At the same time as the development of the Sunset Crater site, the Sinagua developed Wupatki as an important village and area trade center. The loop drive that winds around Sunset Crater and Wupatki contains over 2000 ruins dating from the year A.D. 500 to A.D.1400. The Sinagua had settled Wupatki about the year A.D. 500, and left when the nearby volcano erupted, coming back about 50 years later to settle the area again. Along with them came the master builders, the Kayenta Anasazi, and the Cohonina who brought new pottery making techniques. Together, they built a thriving multi-storied village. Trade was active and artifacts indicate contact with Mesoamerica. People began to leave the area about the time of a recorded drought in the 1200's. Some moved south to the Verde Valley, others to the Hopi mesas. The Hopi Parrot Clan and the Snake Clan trace their ancestors to the site.
